"In Israel, children followed me spontaneously... one time I met a child who wanted to speak to me but couldn't walk because he'd lost his legs, so I gave him my sneakers and signed them," he said gently.

"I have been called to New York when the city was in distress, because a mother had jumped off a building with her baby and she'd encouraged her five and seven year old children to jump too.

"I think the pain kids are going through today is much

more painful than what I'm going through, so I'm on a mission and I've made a commitment to keep on going," he added passionately.

He said a good servant to the people constitutes a good leader, and his mission is not yet complete.

"I can't see myself handing my shoes in any time soon," Mr Garcia chimed in.
